Costs:

Monies spent to date: \$2,463.45.

Results:

Approximately 683 households received the survey, 39 persons returned them and several verbal notations made.

Of the 39 received, 7 advised they did not receive the magnets and flyers, the remaining were all positive results. Those being: that magnets and flyers helped to clarify “what is to be recycled” and “the 3 steps for continued recycling”. This flyer is enclosed in the summary package.

The Township’s various seasonal newsletters provide updates with regard to Waste Management and are a constant reminder to all rate payers that recycling is mandatory in this municipality.

Participated in the Pitch-in week; we had several events and conducted clean-up activities throughout the township.

Successes:

The increased volumes of recycling in the township are the greatest success story to date. We have increased year over year by approximately 35%. We know we still have a long way to reach the goals, but are well on the way.

The purchase of the three sets of recycling bins provide further information with regard to what to recycle and where to put it in the bins. The community centre is attended on a daily basis for ongoing community programs for Health and Wellness.

These bins are “very successful” as both educational and promotional devices.

Challenges:

The local rate payers are one of the biggest challenges. Lack of understanding and resistance to change create negative responses to our requests for recycling.

Investigation/exploration of Green Energy sites is also a challenge. Approval from the various ministries is/can be a long and tedious procedure.

Newspapers, all flyers, magazines, catalogues, telephone books, fibre egg cartons, brown paper bags, old boxboard, residential household paper and paperback books.

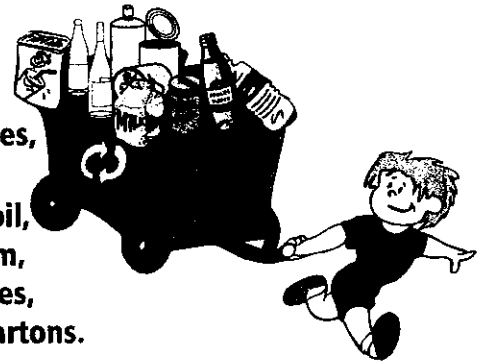
NOT ACCEPTABLE

Ceramics, dishes, window glass, pyrex, drinking glasses, aerosol cans, paint cans, metal pots and pans, sheet metal, vinyl siding, butter and candy wrappers, 'take-out' lids, metallic potato chip and snack food bags and blisteroid for tablets or pills.

CO-MINGLED

Items that can be placed together in clear plastic bags and tied shut are:

Glass bottles, jars, beverage and food cans, pet bottles, rigid plastic bottles, mixed plastics, aluminum trays and foil, polystyrene, styrofoam, tetra pak drinking boxes, poly coat milk and juice cartons.



Please rinse all containers prior to placing in the bag for recycling

WHAT IS RECYCLABLE?

In **Tudor and Cashel** the following items are part of our blue box recycling program. For a complete list please contact us.



Paper: Household paper such as letters, envelopes and newspaper



Glass Bottles and Jars: Food and beverage containers, labels removed and rinsed out



Opaque Plastic Bottles: Shampoo, detergent and cleaning product type bottles



Tubs and Lids: Margarine and yogurt type containers, rinsed out



Clear Plastic Bottles: Water, beverage and other clear plastic bottles



Aluminum Cans: Beverage cans such as pop, energy drinks, etc.



Corrugated Cardboard: Packaging and other cardboard



Boxboard Carton: Boxes such as cereal boxes, tissue boxes, etc.



Aluminum Foil: Includes aluminum plates, roasting pans, etc., rinsed of excess food

HOW DO I RECYCLE?

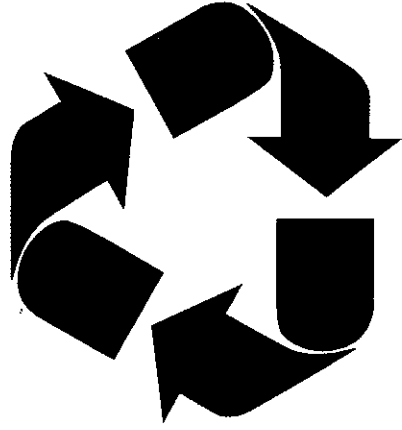


Recycling is quick and easy. By setting up recycling in your home, in key areas, you can make the process a simple part of your day. Below are some tips and tricks to help integrate recycling into your household routines:

- Place recycling containers in key areas such as the kitchen and bathroom.
- Post recycling lists in these key areas.
- Do it right away, as soon as you are done with your product, so you won't forget.
- Get everyone involved. If all family members recycle, it is less work overall.
- Keep your blue box or container clean by rinsing out recyclables before putting them in.

By keeping recycling as part of your daily life it is not only easier, it makes a greater impact on our local and global environment.

COLLECTION INFORMATION

Once you have collected your recyclable materials, the final step is to get them to the depot.

Here is disposal information for **Tudor and Cashel:**

Disposal Schedule:

Waste Management and Recycle Depots are open to the public on Saturdays, Sundays, Wednesdays and statutory holidays. A schedule of specific hours is available at our township office or on our website.

Depot Information:

The Millbridge and Grimsthorpe sites require your co-operation in **crushing** and **compacting** all recyclable materials.

Acceptable Containers:

Paper products can be compacted into small cardboard boxes. Otherwise, all cardboard boxes should be broken down and bound. Other recyclables are to be **crushed, compacted and disposed of in clear plastic bags.**

Waste Processing Centre Location:

Remember to take all garbage and recyclables to the Millbridge and Grimsthorpe sites on disposal days during scheduled hours.

Please do not leave any waste at the gates.

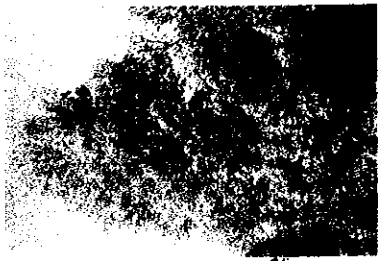
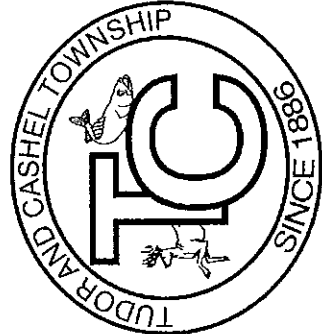

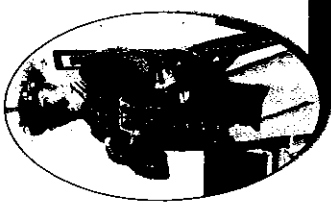

Hats off to all who participated, volunteered their time, and those who organized and implemented our amazing celebration. Great job! It was immensely appreciated!

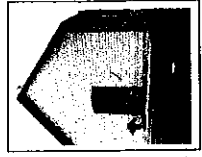
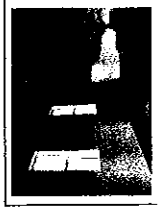

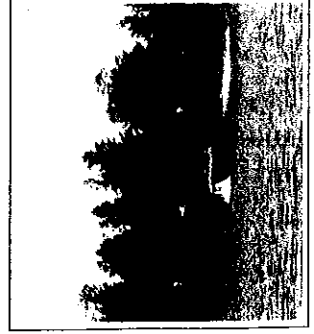

MARINE SAFETY

Always Wear your Lifejacket - If you don't wear it, it won't work. Examine PFDs and lifejackets for wear and tear and identify those that need replacing. If you have inflatable PFDs be sure to be familiar with their operating instructions.

Don't Drink & Boat - It is unacceptable to drink and drive a motor vehicle and the same holds true for drinking and boating. If you are caught operating a vessel while impaired you will also lose your ability to operate your motor vehicle.



Check your Boat!
Familiarize yourself with the boat you are operating. Check the condition of your vessel and ensure it is properly prepared for the boating season.

Be Prepared! Mechanical breakdowns account for a significant number of calls for assistance to the Ontario Provincial Police. Most of these embarrassing incidents are preventable by ensuring your vessel is serviceable. Be certain you have sufficient gas. Part of being prepared is also making sure that the weather and water conditions are suitable for your day out on the water.

Planning - Remember when things go wrong on the water, it happens very quickly and you don't always have time to react. A prudent skipper always discusses his or her plans with a family member before they set out.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

What is an emergency survival kit?

An emergency survival kit contains all the basic items, including your Emergency Preparedness Action Plan that you will need to remain comfortable for at least three days immediately after or during an emergency. You should ensure you have all your basic supplies with you. Remember to keep your kit in an easy-to-reach location, and that everyone in your family knows where it is stored.

What do I include in my kit?

Your emergency survival kit should be unique to your household. The basic items you should have in your kit include:

- Flashlight
- Radio
- Important documents (identification)
- Non-perishable foods
- Utensils
- Bottled water (4 litres per person, per day)
- Clothing & footwear
- Hygiene products
- Sleeping bag & blankets

Community Fundraisers:

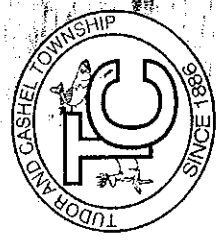

Waste Management:

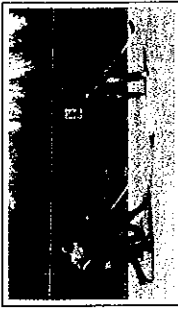

We need an even better number for 2012, so keep up the good work and let's put forth an even bigger and better effort to recycle more. **Our goal is 91 tons of recycling per year.**

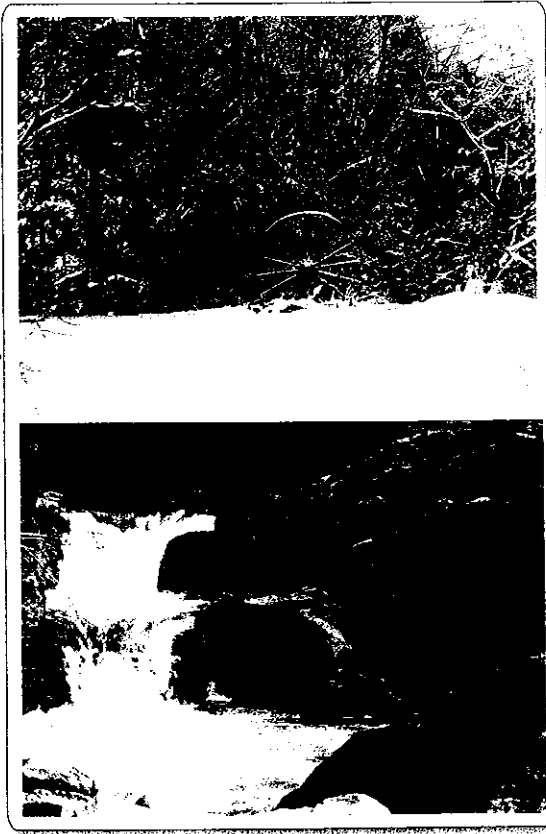
